Everyone who comes into contact with children and their families and carers has a role to play in safeguarding children. They fulfil this responsibility effectively by:

- protecting children from maltreatment
- preventing impairment of children's health or development
- ensuring that children grow up in circumstances consistent with the provision of safe and effective care and taking action to enable all children to have the best outcomes

Cummersdale School is committed to ensuring that all children are safeguarded and pupil welfare is paramount. All staff are aware of their duty of care to protect our children and help to keep them safe.



If a child says or otherwise communicates something that contradicts or conflicts with the parents/carers account of their health or welfare, then we all have a clear duty of care to ensure that any discrepancies are properly investigated and explained. We will make any referrals necessary to ensure the well-being of all children is safeguarded.

It is important for children to receive the right help at the right time to address risks and prevent issues escalating. Research and Serious Case Reviews have repeatedly shown the dangers of failing to take effective action.

Bullying

Bullying is not tolerated at Cummersdale School. We reinforce this message through assemblies, PHSE lessons and it is embedded in our school and class rules. Anyone who has concerns about their child being bullied should speak to their child’s class teacher as soon as possible in order for the issues to be addressed.
